Maritime Moment By Justin McIntyre: SCMM Historian and Curator

Just before 1 AM on the morning of 2/2/1913, the four-masted schooner, *City of Georgetown*, collided with the Hamburg-Amerika/American ocean liner *SS Prinz Oskar* just outside of the Delaware Breakwater. *City of Georgetown*, sailing south from New York to Savannah carrying a cargo of salt, was hidden within the glare of the Five Fathom Bank lightship. *Prinz Oskar*, bound from Philadelphia to Hamburg, was on course to pass in front of *City of Georgetown*, unaware of the southbound schooner. By the time *Prinz Oskar* spotted *City of Georgetown* it was too late. *City of Georgetown* played into the southbound schooner. By the time Prinz Oskar spotted City of Georgetown it was too late. City of Georgetown plowed into the portside bow of the liner. Reversing engines, *Prinz Oskar* ripped the bow off the doomed schooner. Within minutes *City of Georgetown* was lost. Fortunately there were no casualties. Ultimately, fault was placed on the crew of *Prinz Oskar* for failing to yield to a sailing ship. *City of Georgetown's* captain, Abram J. Slocum, would tragically vanish in March 1914 while in command of the schooner *Levi S*. Andrews somewhere between Norfolk and Savannah.
