Maritime Moment By Justin McIntyre: SCMM Historian and Curator

On January 23, 1929, the much-loved steamer, *Comanche*, was destroyed in fire started by Georgetown local Isaac Holmes in an attempt to stay warm. Built in Baldwinsville, New York and launched in 1895, *Comanche* was purchased for use on Georgetown's area waterways transporting passengers and freight by the Waccamaw Transportation Company. The ship arrived in Georgetown on November 1, 1910. *Comanche* was also chartered for cruises to popular local destinations such as North Island. There were even moonlight cruises around Winyah Bay! By the time of the ship's destruction, *Comanche* had fallen into disrepair and had been out of service for some time. A bench from *Comanche* originally owned by Frank Sarvis (a former captain of the ship) was graciously donated to the museum by Robin Salmon and family.
